To hold him who taught me this art equally dear ...as my parents, to be a partner in life and to fulfill his needs when required; to look upon his offspring as equals to my own siblings, and to teach them this art, without fee or contract; and that by the set rules, lectures, and every other mode of instruction, I will impart a knowledge of the art to my own sons, and those of my teachers, and to students bound by this contract and having sworn this Oath to the law of medicine, but to no others.

Physicians oath of **Maimonides**(1135-1204)

"Should those who are wiser than I wish to improve and instruct me, let my soul gratefully follow their guidance; for vast is the extent of our art.

"Imbue my soul with gentleness and calmness when older colleagues, proud of their age, wish to displace me or......disdainfully to teach me. May even this be of advantage to me, for they know many things of which I am ignorant, but let not their arrogance give me pain.



- (1) Integrity, honesty, and ethics are the cornerstones of your success. Financial security will always follow.
- (2) Charge fairly and appropriately.
- (3) Be charitable, and extend yourself to do charity work and non-paid teaching.

- (4) Your office environment, cleanliness, washroom areas all impact on patients, families, friends as to your own surgical skills.
- (5) Be generous with your time for patients and their families.
- (6) Know how many times your phone rings, called by whom, and for what purpose.

- (7) Be prompt with your schedule. To be late is RUDE and arrogant.
- (8) Be charitable toward your professional colleagues. Teach and share with them. You will thus earn their respect and gratitude.
- (9) Criticize not. Professional enemies last forever! Turn-about actions become inevitable at great risk to yourself.

- (10) Protect the (other) doctor from patient criticisms when possible. Your adverse statements return to the doctor via the patient or the family. Do not lie. Avoid comment.
- (11) Only do that specific work for which a patient was referred to you. Nothing more (it is unprofessional to do so).
- (12) Insist on professional relationships between your staff and the staff of referring doctors, patients, families.

(13) Your patients' claiming ("excessive") charges and collection attempts are absolute disasters for you.

(14) Learn from anyone and everyone who can benefit your patients.

(15) Read, study, discuss, practice - forever.

- (16) Keep formal records of your training and document the experiences (photos, op reports)
- (17) Learn techniques to minimize patient and family physical and emotional distress.
- (18) Establish a network of consultants friendly to you and your work. Then, do not hesitate to seek consultation when in doubt.

- (19) Your publications and presentations are your specialty's avenue to present you earned honors and accolades.
- Be meticulously honest with both.
- (20) Get an academic appointment and find the time to teach. Other doctors respect this, and patients love their doctors to be teachers. Such implies competence.
- (21) Be quick to send your records when requested. Offer to help any way you can.

- (22) Be alert to the failings of your colleagues (alcohol, drugs, sex). Intervene only through proper professional channels and societies.
- (23) Fight nepotism and program control by any "chosen few".
- (24) Study all appropriate journals, going back as far as possible. Browse your medical center library monthly if possible.

- (25) Attend appropriate meetings to expand your knowledge and skills. Whenever possible, <u>cross-fertilize</u> with other specialties.
- (26) If you refer a patient, it is your professional right to attend the intervention, hopefully as assistant. If denied, find another specialist to whom you can send patients and be treated in a professional manner.
- (27) Finest work requires (reasonably) the finest instruments, sutures, needles, sterilization, power tables, etc., etc. .

- (28) Surgical personalities <u>are</u> impatient personalities. Know yourself. Take the necessary time for consultation, reflection, history & lab review, etc.
- (29) Answer phone calls from physicians as quickly as possible and from patients /families same day.
- (30) Patients maintain rights of privacy including from their own family.

Choose the typeface.

- (31) Look like a Surgeon and Act like a Surgeon if you are representing yourself as a dermatologic surgeon. Gloves, cap mask, sterile milieu, etc.
- (32) Surgery rooms reserved for appropriate procedures, represent (reasonably) state-of-the-art technology.
- (33) Your "comfort level" will inevitably be at variance with your "competence level" at times. STOP!. Get consultation, wait, refer.

- (34) If a "significant other" is <u>against</u> proceeding, don't! They can <u>easily</u> turn patient against you, with undesirable legal ramifications.
- (35) Observe many. Watch, listen, filter.
- (36) Critique mentally, criticize mentally, disagree silently. "There are many roads to Rome"

- (37) The more you know, the more you learn
- (38) Remember who taught you praise and thank them openly. It will humble you, and remind you of the very, very long journey you have taken to your knowledge.
- (39) Forget you have not had this complication (or that one). It means <u>nothing</u> to the one you do have or will have!

- (40) ALWAYS err on the side of conservatism, especially cosmetic procedures.
- (41) Models and body builders <u>always</u> seek perfection even when they deny it.
- (42) Ethnic, cultural, religious differences and sensitivities do exist between peoples. Learn, observe, question, confirm, document.


- (43) All new employees in your office should be cleared by your present employees whenever possible!
- (44) YOU <u>must</u> be your <u>patient's advocate</u>. They know little / nothing You "know it all"!
- (45) PLEASE and THANK YOU remain eternal necessities. Use them! Regardless of your status or theirs....

(46) Work diligently for RESPECT - both of <u>self</u>, and <u>from your peers</u>.

Both are hard-earned, and worth every possible effort to achieve.


(47) Always remember it is a PRIVILEGE to practice medicine, as well as a science and an art.

KEEP YOURSELF PHYSICALLY, EMOTIONALLY, & PSYCHOLOGICALLY FRESH!


Study, study – all appropriate professional literature – Special issues in JDSO, DS, Derm Clinics

5 rules by which to judge the ethical conduct of doctors *

- 1. Doctors who do not refer to other doctors when they are unclear of a diagnosis or when the patient is not progressing as well as anticipated are not serving the best interests of their patients.
- 2. Doctors who do not reveal their own work (as in before-and-after photos or their experience with a given condition) are protecting themselves.
 - 3. Doctors who spend time disparaging doctors are not focusing on their patient's needs.
 - 4. Doctors who promise perfect results are not perfect.
 - 5. Doctors who do not touch or examine their patients before surgery should not be touching them during surgery.
